NEXCOM manufactures products that are new or equivalent to new in accordance with industry standard. NEXCOM warrants that products will be free from defect in material and workmanship for 2 years, beginning on the date of invoice by NEXCOM. HCP series products (Blade Server) which are manufactured by NEXCOM are covered by a three year warranty period.

NEXCOM Return Merchandise Authorization (RMA)

- Customers shall enclose the "NEXCOM RMA Service Form" with the returned packages.
- Customers must collect all the information about the problems encountered and note anything abnormal or, print out any on-screen messages, and describe the problems on the "NEXCOM RMA Service Form" for the RMA number apply process.
- Customers can send back the faulty products with or without accessories (manuals, cable, etc.) and any components from the card, such as CPU and RAM. 



CHAPTER 2: JUMPERS AND CONNECTORS

This chapter describes how to set the jumpers and connectors on the NDiS M535 motherboard.

Before You Begin

- Ensure you have a stable, clean working environment. Dust and dirt can get into components and cause a malfunction. Use containers to keep small components separated.
- Adequate lighting and proper tools can prevent you from accidentally damaging the internal components. Most of the procedures that follow require only a few simple tools, including the following:
 - A Philips screwdriver
 - A flat-tipped screwdriver
 - A set of jewelers screwdrivers
 - A grounding strap
 - An anti-static pad
- Using your fingers can disconnect most of the connections. It is recommended that you do not use needle-nosed pliers to disconnect connections as these can damage the soft metal or plastic parts of the connectors.
- Before working on internal components, make sure that the power is off.
 Ground yourself before touching any internal components, by touching a metal object. Static electricity can damage many of the electronic components. Humid environments tend to have less static electricity than

dry environments. A grounding strap is warranted whenever danger of static electricity exists.

Precautions

Computer components and electronic circuit boards can be damaged by discharges of static electricity. Working on computers that are still connected to a power supply can be extremely dangerous.

Follow the guidelines below to avoid damage to your computer or yourself:


- Always disconnect the unit from the power outlet whenever you are working inside the case.
- If possible, wear a grounded wrist strap when you are working inside the computer case. Alternatively, discharge any static electricity by touching the bare metal chassis of the unit case, or the bare metal body of any other grounded appliance.
- Hold electronic circuit boards by the edges only. Do not touch the components on the board unless it is necessary to do so. Don't flex or stress the circuit board.
- Leave all components inside the static-proof packaging that they shipped with until they are ready for installation.
- Use correct screws and do not over tighten screws.






Locations of the Jumpers and Connectors for NDiB M535NDiB M535

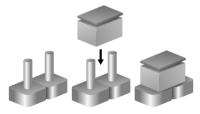


Jumper Settings

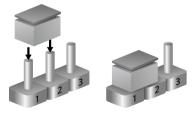
A jumper is the simplest kind of electric switch. It consists of two metal pins and a cap. When setting the jumpers, ensure that the jumper caps are placed on the correct pins. When the jumper cap is placed on both pins, the jumper is short. If you remove the jumper cap, or place the jumper cap on just one pin, the jumper is open.

Refer to the illustrations below for examples of what the 2-pin and 3-pin jumpers look like when they are short (on) and open (off).

CHAPTER 3: SYSTEM SETUP

Removing the Chassis Cover



Prior to removing the chassis cover, make sure the unit's power is off and disconnected from the power sources to prevent electric shock or system damage.

1. The screws on the back and sides are used to secure the cover to the chassis. Remove these screws and put them in a safe place for later use.

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


Installing a SO-DIMM Memory Module

1. At the bottom of the system, loosen the screws on the bottom cover and on the side, then remove the cover from the chassis.










2. Push the ejector tabs which are at the ends of the socket outward. This indicates that the socket is unlocked.

Note how the module is keyed to the socket. Grasping the module by its edges, align the module with the socket so that the "notch" on the module is aligned with the "key" on the socket. The key ensures the module can be plugged into the socket in only one direction.



3. Insert the module into the socket at an approximately 30 degree angle. Apply firm even pressure to each end of the module until it slips down into the socket. The contact fingers on the edge of the module will almost completely disappear inside the socket.

The ejector tabs at the ends of the socket will automatically snap into the locked position to hold the module in place.





Installing a 2.5" SSD/HDD Storage

The system is equipped with a removable 2.5" HDD drive bay. To install a HDD, please follow the instructions below.



Before installing a 2.5" HDD, please make sure the top OPS cover is secured firmly with screws, otherwise the HDD connector on the mainboard may be damaged.

1. Remove the HDD cover located at the front panel by loosening the screw.



2. Gently take the cover out.




3. Align the mounting holes on the front of the HDD to the mounting holes on the cover, then tighten screws on both sides to secure it. Make sure the connector side of the HDD is facing outwards.





4. Stick the protective pad on the bottom of the HDD to prevent short circuiting with the chassis.




5. Place the HDD back into the slot, then tighten the screw to secure it.





Installing a Wireless LAN Module

1. With the chassis cover removed, locate the mini-PCIe slot on the mainboard.



2. Insert the Wi-Fi module into the mini-PCI Express slot at a 45 degree angle until the gold-plated connector on the edge of the module completely disappears inside the slot.








3. With the module fully inserted, tighten a screw into the mounting hole on the module to secure it.



4. Attach the RF cables onto the Wi-Fi module and insert the antenna jack end of the cable through the antenna hole.






5. Insert the 2 rings (ring 1 then ring 2) into the Wi-Fi antenna jacks.






6. Connect the external antennas to the Wi-Fi antenna jacks.





Installing a SIM Card

1. With the chassis bottom cover removed, locate the SIM card slot on the mainboard.



2. Insert the SIM card into the slot.





CHAPTER 4: BIOS SETUP

This chapter describes how to use the BIOS setup program for the NDiS M535. The BIOS screens provided in this chapter are for reference only and may change if the BIOS is updated in the future.

About BIOS Setup

The BIOS (Basic Input and Output System) Setup program is a menu driven utility that enables you to make changes to the system configuration and tailor your system to suit your individual work needs. It is a ROM-based configuration utility that displays the system's configuration status and provides you with a tool to set system parameters.

These parameters are stored in non-volatile battery-backed-up CMOS RAM that saves this information even when the power is turned off. When the system is turned back on, the system is configured with the values found in CMOS.

With easy-to-use pull down menus, you can configure items such as:

- Hard drives, diskette drives, and peripherals
- Video display type and display options
- Password protection from unauthorized use
- Power management features

The settings made in the setup program affect how the computer performs. It is important, therefore, first to try to understand all the setup options, and second, to make settings appropriate for the way you use the computer.

When to Configure the BIOS

- This program should be executed under the following conditions:
- When changing the system configuration
- When a configuration error is detected by the system and you are prompted to make changes to the setup program
- When resetting the system clock
- When redefining the communication ports to prevent any conflicts
- When making changes to the Power Management configuration
- When changing the password or making other changes to the security setup

Normally, CMOS setup is needed when the system hardware is not consistent with the information contained in the CMOS RAM, whenever the CMOS RAM has lost power, or the system features need to be changed.





Default Configuration

Most of the configuration settings are either predefined according to the Load Optimal Defaults settings which are stored in the BIOS or are automatically detected and configured without requiring any actions. There are a few settings that you may need to change depending on your system configuration.

Entering Setup

When the system is powered on, the BIOS will enter the Power-On Self Test (POST) routines. These routines perform various diagnostic checks; if an error is encountered, the error will be reported in one of two different ways:

- If the error occurs before the display device is initialized, a series of beeps will be transmitted
- If the error occurs after the display device is initialized, the screen will display the error message.

Powering on the computer and immediately pressing allows you to enter Setup.

Press the bell key to enter Setup:

Scroll Bar

When a scroll bar appears to the right of the setup screen, it indicates that there are more available fields not shown on the screen. Use the up and down arrow keys to scroll through all the available fields.

Submenu

When "▶" appears on the left of a particular field, it indicates that a submenu which contains additional options are available for that field. To display the submenu, move the highlight to that field and press .



BIOS Setup Utility

Once you enter the AMI BIOS Setup Utility, the Main Menu will appear on the screen. The main menu allows you to select from several setup functions and one exit. Use arrow keys to select among the items and press to accept or enter the submenu.

Main

The Main menu is the first screen that you will see when you enter the BIOS Setup Utility.



System Date

The date format is <day>, <month>, <date>, <year>. Day displays a day, from Monday to Sunday. Month displays the month, from January to December. Date displays the date, from 1 to 31. Year displays the year, from 1999 to 2099.

System Time

The time format is <hour>, <minute>, <second>. The time is based on the 24-hour military-time clock. For example, 1 p.m. is 13:00:00. Hour displays hours from 00 to 23. Minute displays minutes from 00 to 59. Second displays seconds from 00 to 59.




Advanced

The Advanced menu allows you to configure your system for basic operation. Some entries are defaults required by the system board, while others, if enabled, will improve the performance of your system or let you set some features according to your preference.



Setting incorrect field values may cause the system to malfunction.



ACPI Settings

This section is used to configure ACPI settings.



Enable Hibernation

Enables or disables system ability to hibernate (OS/S4 Sleep State). This option may not be effective with some OS.


ACPI Sleep State

Select the highest ACPI sleep state the system will enter when the suspend button is pressed. The options are Suspend Disabled and S3 (Suspend to RAM).



Module Management

This section is used to configure onboard module settings.



Mini Card

Enables or disables boot for mini card.

Restore on AC Power Loss

Select AC power state when power is re-applied after a power failure.

USB Wake Up

Enables or disables wake up from USB devices.

AMT Configuration

This section is used to configure Active Management Technology (AMT) options.



Intel® AMT

Enables or disables Intel® Active Management Technology.


Un-Configure ME

Enables or disables un-configure ME without password. Enabled will clear all ME settings.



IT8528 Super IO Configuration

This section is used to configure serial port 2.



Serial Port 2 Configuration

Enters the sub-menu of serial port 2 configuration.

Serial Port 2 Configuration



Serial Port

Enables or disables the serial port.


Device Settings

Displays the IO address and IRQ of serial port 2.



Hardware Monitor

This section is used to monitor hardware status such as temperature, fan speed and voltages.



FAN Mode

Configures the fan mode. The options are Disabled (0%), Smart Fan, Programmable Fan and FAN Full On.

System FAN Speed

Enables or disables fan speed control of the system.

CPU Temperature(DTS)

Detects and displays the current CPU temperature.

System Temperature

Detects and displays the internal temperature of the system.

VCORE to VCC3

Detects and displays the output voltages.


FAN Speed

Detects and displays the current fan speed.



RTC Wake Settings

This section is used to configure RTC Wake settings.



Wake System from S5

Enables or disables system wake on alarm event. When enabled, system will wake on the hr::min::sec specified.

Graphics Configuration

Configures the graphics chip settings.



Primary IGFX Boot Display

Selects the video device which will be activated during POST. Has no effect if external graphics is present. Secondary boot display selection will appear based on your selection. VGA modes will be supported only on primary display.

Secondary IGFX Boot Display

Selects the secondary display device.








CPU Configuration

This section is used to configure the CPU.



Hyper Threading

Enables or disables hyper-threading technology.

Intel® Virtualization Technology

When this field is set to Enabled, the VMM can utilize the additional hardware capabilities provided by Vanderpool Technology.

CPU AES

Enables or disables Advanced Encryption Standard instruction set.

Intel® SpeedStep™

Enables or disables Intel SpeedStep.

Turbo Mode

Enables or disables turbo mode.



SATA Configuration

This section is used to configure the SATA drives.



SATA Controller(s)

Enables or disables the SATA controller.

SATA Test Mode

Enables or disables SATA test mode.

Port 2

Enables or disables Serial ATA port 2.

Hot Plug

Enables or disables hot plugging feature on Serial ATA port 2.

USB Configuration

This section is used to configure the USB.



Legacy USB Support

Enabled Enables Legacy USB.

Auto Disables support for Legacy when no USB devices are connected.

Disabled Keeps USB devices available only for EFI applications.

XHCI Hand-off


This is a workaround for OSs that does not support XHCI hand-off. The XHCI ownership change should be claimed by the XHCI driver.







Security



Administrator Password

Select this to reconfigure the administrator's password.

User Password

Select this to reconfigure the user's password.

Boot



Bootup NumLock State

This allows you to determine the default state of the numeric keypad. By default, the system boots up with NumLock on wherein the function of the numeric keypad is the number keys. When set to Off, the function of the numeric keypad is the arrow keys.

Boot Mode


Configures the boot mode as Legacy BIOS or UEFI BIOS Mode.

Launch PXE OpROM

Enables or disables the boot option for legacy network devices.



Save & Exit



Save Changes and Exit

To save the changes and exit the Setup utility, select this field then press <Enter>. A dialog box will appear. Confirm by selecting Yes. You can also press <F4> to save and exit Setup.

Discard Changes and Exit

To exit the Setup utility without saving the changes, select this field then press <Enter>. You may be prompted to confirm again before exiting. You can also press <ESC> to exit without saving the changes.

Restore Defaults

To restore the BIOS to default settings, select this field then press <Enter>. A dialog box will appear. Confirm by selecting Yes.



APPENDIX A: WATCHDOG TIMER

Use the GPF4 as the watchdog output for connecting to system reset. The watchdog settings can be configured using the BRAM interface with 1 control bit and 1 watchdog timer value. The timer supports values ranging from 3 to 255 seconds and 1 to 255 minutes. The BRAM addresses and corresponding functions for configuring through BIOS and applications are listed in the table below.
